Facilitator's Biographies

Professor Kevin Fenton CBE MBBS (Hons) MSc PhD FFPH

Professor Fenton is a senior public health expert and infectious disease epidemiologist, who has worked in a variety of public health executive leadership roles across government and academia in the UK and internationally, including taking a leading role in London's response to the COVID-19 pandemic.



He was awarded a CBE in the 2022 New Year honours list for services to public health. Professor Fenton became the Regional Director for London in the Office for Health Improvement and Disparities (OHID) within the Department of Health and Social Care (DHSC) in October 2021, having previously held the same position within Public Health England from April 2020 until its functions transferred to OHID. Within this role, he is also the statutory public health advisor to the Mayor of London and the Greater London Authority and the Regional Director of Public Health for NHS London. He provides leadership across London for health and wellbeing, prevention of ill health, health protection and reduction of health inequalities.

Professor Fenton has recently been elected to be the next President of the UK Faculty of Public Health and is due to take up the position in July 2022. In December 2021, Professor Fenton was appointed Chief Advisor on HIV to Government and Chair of the HIV Action Plan Implementation Steering Group to oversee the delivery of the new HIV strategy for England.

In November 2020, Professor Fenton was named by Powerlist as the second most influential black person in Britain for his work leading the fight against coronavirus and his public health leadership on tackling inequalities. In Spring 2020, he oversaw the national PHE review of disparities in risks and outcomes of COVID-19, published as the ground-breaking 'Beyond the Data' report. The review led to recommendations which have shaped a more equitable COVID-19 pandemic response, both nationally and locally.

Professor Sir Michael Marmot FBA FMedSci FRCP

Sir Michael Marmot has been Professor of Epidemiology at University College London since 1985 and is Director of the UCL Institute of Health Equity.

He is the author of The Health Gap: the challenge of an unequal world (Bloomsbury: 2015), and Status Syndrome (Bloomsbury: 2004).



Professor Marmot is the Advisor to the WHO Director-General, on social determinants of health, in the new WHO Division of Healthier Populations; Distinguished Visiting Professor at Chinese University of Hong Kong (2019-), and co-Director of the of the CUHK Institute of Health Equity.

He is the recipient of the WHO Global Hero Award; the Harvard Lown Professorship (2014-2017); the Prince Mahidol Award for Public Health (2015), and 19 honorary doctorates. Marmot has led research groups on health inequalities for nearly 50 years. He chaired the WHO Commission on Social Determinants of Health, several WHO Regional Commissions, and reviews on tackling health inequality for governments in the UK.

He served as President of the British Medical Association (BMA) in 2010-2011, and as President of the World Medical Association in 2015. He is President of the British Lung Foundation. He is a Fellow of the Academy of Medical Sciences and Honorary Fellow of the American College of Epidemiology and of the Faculty of Public Health; an Honorary Fellow of the British Academy; and of the Royal Colleges of Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Psychiatry, Paediatrics and Child Health, and General Practitioners. He is an elected member of the US National Academy of Medicine and of the Brazilian Academy of Medicine. He was a member of the Royal Commission on Environmental Pollution for six years and in 2000 he was knighted by Her Majesty The Queen, for services to epidemiology and the understanding of health inequalities.

Dr Sandra Husbands

Dr Sandra Husbands is Director of Public Health for the City of London and London Borough of Hackney. She is also a ADPH UK Board member.

Before coming to East London, she was Executive Director of Public Health at Abertawe Bro Morgannwg University Health Board/Swansea Bay University Health Board, in South West Wales.

Dr Husbands has over 30 years' experience in health care, research, and academia in the UK

and internationally. She has held several senior public health roles at local and regional level, in the NHS, local government and Public Health England.

Sandra is devoted to unleashing the power of individuals and communities to improve their own health and wellbeing. She is committed to driving improved population health through engaging communities and improving health care quality to achieve better outcomes for patients. Her interests are increasing health literacy, preventing and improving outcomes from long-term conditions, and making better use of resources to improve outcomes.

Tom Rahilly

Tom is Assistant Director for Communities and Social Policy, responsible for providing strategic leadership across the Unit which includes teams on social inclusion, equalities and fairness and community engagement.

The Communities and Social Policy Unit also work closely with the GLA's City Intelligence Unit to support the development of London's social evidence base.

Prior to joining the GLA Tom was Director of the UK Programme at Save the Children, where he led work across England, Scotland, Wales, and Northern Ireland to tackle child poverty and improve early years services for children and families. Tom started his career in central Government where he worked in the Sure Start Unit and as Deputy Head of the UK Government's Child Poverty Unit

Lizzie Smith

With 20 years' experience of NHS Management, Lizzie Smith was appointed as HEE Regional Director for London in April 2019. Lizzie has worked for HEE since its establishment in 2012, previously as Local Director across North West London. As the Regional Director she is responsible for leading all aspects of HEE's work across London, supporting workforce supply and transformation across all health and care settings.

Prior to the establishment of HEE, Lizzie was Head of Education Planning and Market

Development in the NHS London People and Organisational Development directorate.

More recently, in partnership with NHSE/I, Lizzie has co-led the workforce cell in supporting the regional response to the pandemic and she has just taken on the leadership role of the NHS anchors programme, aligning to her passion to support the NHS to realise its wider value and role in London's economic and social recovery, whilst addressing health inequalities across the capital

Dr Shona Arora

Dr Shona Arora is currently UKHSA's interim Director of Health Equity and Clinical Governance.

Prior to this she was PHE's Deputy Director for Public Health Workforce/ and led the development of a national public health workforce strategy in 2015. She joined PHE in 2013 as Centre Director for Avon Gloucestershire & Wiltshire, after 12 years as Director of Public Health in Gloucestershire.


Shona trained as a doctor, training and working in General Practice and hospital medicine in and around London before qualifying as a Consultant in public health medicine. During
