

Consent:

BEVERLY: The school-aged immunisation service is a part of the NHS and they work with all schools to offer vaccinations to pupils in the appropriate year groups.

BEVERLY: The vaccinations offered have been around for a long, long time. They are safe and effective.

BEVERLY: But before you get your vaccination, your parent or carer will be sent a consent form to complete. The consent form asks whether they agree for you to have the vaccine or not. It may be a paper consent form, or an electronic one sent by email, or to your school's app.

BEVERLY: It only takes a minute to complete, so please remind your parent or carer to complete it so that you don't miss out on the chance to be protected. Around seven in ten parents or carers consent to their child having a vaccine.

BEVERLY: By consenting, they are protecting you from serious diseases. If they don't want you to be protected, they should still complete the consent form to let the school-aged immunisation service know. However, if they simply forgot, then you may be able to consent on the day if the nurse thinks that you are able to do so.
