Honest conversation needed on future public health funding

ADPH has called for an “honest conversation” on public health funding in the lead up to next year’s Spending Review, following today’s Budget. Directors of Public Health are warning that the current funding situation is “not sustainable” and that the Government needs to work towards a “long-term funding package for public health.”

ADPH Chief Executive, Nicola Close, said:

“Investing more in the NHS is a good start but health is about more than the NHS. We now need to have an honest conversation about the funding required for our frontline public health services such as obesity programmes, drug and alcohol treatment, sexual health, health visitors and school nurses.

“Directors of Public Health have been relentlessly focussed on effectively managing £700 million worth of cuts, in the context of increasing demand, whilst also modernising services. However, this is not sustainable, especially when combined with the wider cuts to local government which have hit a range of community facilities central to public health, such as libraries and leisure centres.

“Next year’s Spending Review provides the Government with a unique opportunity to set out a long-term funding package for public health. This must include £3.2 billion a year extra into public health grants, and additional resources to promote the wider public health agenda, from poverty to housing to transport to crime.”
