Responsibility for key public health services will remain with councils

The Department of Health and Social Care has confirmed that key public health services will remain the responsibility of local authorities. The NHS Long Term Plan had proposed a “stronger role for the NHS” in the commissioning of sexual health, health visiting and school nursing services.

Jeanelle de Gruchy, President of the ADPH, said:

"This is a hugely welcome decision. The evidence confirms that public health in local government is developing innovative approaches to public health services and delivering good outcomes for sexual and reproductive health as well for children and young people.

"There is an opportunity to build on this widespread best practice. Directors of Public Health are committed to continuing to work with the DHSC, NHSE, PHE, and local health bodies to ensure collaborative commissioning and integrated pathways for current and future users of these key services, ensuring we support the shift to prevention in all we do.

"To enable this to happen, and meet the rising demand for our services, the spending review must provide a significant and sustainable funding package for public health in local government."
